Coolup, in the Shire of Murray, has unveiled a giant mural that has transformed the local Community hall.

Measuring 16 metres long and five metres high, the stunning black and white aerosol mural depicts local ANZAC stories and was completed in time for ANZAC Day. Painted by self-taught artist *Shakey*, the giant installation was commissioned by the Coolup Progress Association as part of its *ANZAC Memorial Revitalisation Project*. It is installed on the southern external wall of the Coolup Community Hall.

The mural depicts two local stories: "The Baker Boys", which was the real-life tale of three local brothers that all went to fight in the Great War, with only one returning, and "Ethel McKay", a local war nurse whose sister married the returning Baker brother, and whose family still live in the area.

Ange Rogers is President of the Coolup Progress Association the organisation behind the innovative painting:

"The Coolup community has supported ANZAC Day activities for a long time"

"The CPA began a popular ANZAC Eve service which is now in its 10th year, They campaigned and paid for the War memorial to be refurbished and relocated, and the community told us they wanted to further acknowledge our local ANZAC links with the painting of a giant mural"

The project has been in the planning for more than two years, during which time Ms Rogers discovered the artist, *Shakey*, who has been responsible for some of the most startling and arresting modern murals in Western Australia, including as part of the Collie Mural Art Trail.

"Shakeys style and attention to detail is unique, and we knew he would capture our local stories perfectly and portray them in a modern and compelling way" said Ms Rogers.

The mural is the largest Shakey has ever undertaken, both in size (75 square metres) and scope.

"It is important to me to depict stories that have genuine local meaning, and that are rooted in real life. The Baker Boys and Ethel McKay are characters whose tales still resonate in this community today, so it's a privilege to be able to bring them back to life like this." Shakey said.

The mural can be seen on the Coolup Community Hall which is on Murray Street, just off the South Western Highway in Coolup. There is a car park adjacent and viewing is free.

The project has been funded through donations from Robyn Clarke MLA, The Coolup Progress Association, the Shire of Murray and Doral Mineral Sands.

We would also like to take a moment to acknowledge the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD) further as without the operational funding they provide, we could not offer the services we provide to our community. The funding allows us to provide many services for free or very low cost.

Have you ever wondered what purpose the many coloured buoys on Egret Lake, opposite the Peel Zoo relate to? They are set in layouts to mark the courses for the various model boat competitions conducted by the Club.

Members compete in yachting events in both International One Metre and Dragon Force 65 craft, sailing on Thursday afternoons and each second Saturday from 1pm.

Sunday mornings from 9 am see the power boats take to the water. These battery powered craft are of various designs and purpose. The Fast Electric boats are small speed boats, running against the clock over a four minute timed event in which laps around the outer buoys are scored accumulate for a season trophy. A Junior event is also run using smaller craft on a shorter course over two minutes. Both groups run single boats at a time to eliminate the mayhem and damage that could (and has) result in some spectacular collisions.

A series of coloured buoys set one metre apart form the course for the Scale Steering competition. Skippers navigate their scale model boats of various sizes and types through a set path with points deducted for touching a buoy or missing an entrance or exit point.

Tunnel Hulls, high speed twin hull boats also run solo over a three minute period for accrual of laps. These boats often take a dive beneath the surface with an anxious wait to resurface. They are also prone to capsize on cornering, but design has them capable to self-right within a few seconds.

Finally, at least one Sunday per month is designated Free Sailing when members bring non-competitive boats down for a bit of quiet sailing. Competition boats also run for test and tune purposes. Craft present sometimes include scale model merchant ships, tugs, a Gordon River catamaran ferry, a model of USS Abraham Lincoln an aircraft carrier approx. 2.4 metres long, and a model of the paddle steamer Pevensey complete with working steam engine.

The Club is currently seeking new members who may have an interest in any of the above craft types. Further information can be obtained from the website ravenswoodmodelboats.org.au or by contact with the writer on 0412 312 156.

As we operate on private property and have certain obligations to the land owner, we are unable to run an open house, but by making contact it can be arranged for you to visit to view our events and gain further information with respect to possibly joining the Club.

For just a look, a small jetty across the road from the peel Zoo is a good vantage point.



TO FIND OUT MORE SCAN ME

May in the garden

Autumn is the best time of the year for planting! With the heat of summer fading and the soil still warm, plants can grow strong roots. Get your vegie patch pumping with crucifers like Broccoli and Cauliflower; root vegies like Garlic and Carrots; as well as Peas and Leafy Greens. Beautify your garden with flowering plants like Sweet Peas and Camellias. Expand your indoor plant collection, feed and get rid of pests. Reinvigorate your lawn by feeding and oversowing or install a brand new one.

Garlic must be in the ground by the end of April, so if you have plans to grow garlic, get the bulbs in today.

Plant flowering annuals like Sweet Peas, spring-flowering bulbs and root vegies like carrots, parsnips, turnips, potatoes, swede turnips, kohlrabi and beetroot.

In May plant out the following vegetables and flowers into punnets and directly into the soil.

Garlic, Do not use shop purchased garlic as it has been sprayed with chemicals, buy from farmers markets or online.	50 -100 garlic cloves or whatever amount you would like to grow for your family.
Cabbage, broccoli, cauliflower and kale	Punnet of 8 seedlings in April and July
Onions. Brown, white and red	Punnet of each. About 70+
Carrot, parsnip, turnips and beetroot. I like to mix soil and seed 50-50 in my hand and sow these veges.	Sow directly into the ground.
Herbs should go into pots to prevent these plants taking over your garden. E.g., Mint.	
Climbing peas, snow Peas, beans and broad beans	50 of each.
Try other varieties of vegetables including swede turnip, kohl rabi, radish, celeriac and celery.	
Plant out seeds of spring bulbs including anemone, daffodils, iris, tulips, ranunculus, alliums, Dutch iris, hyacinth, John Quill, crocus and freesia.	
Cottage garden flowers of delphinium, larkspur, lavender, stocks, pansy, poppy, swan river daisy and many more suitable to the Peel and Murray region. Just ask at your friendly Nursery.	
Potatoes seed potatoes as shop purchased spuds with eyes can have diseases and you do not want to take the disease into your garden beds.	Buy a bag of seed spuds and plant in trenches with mobs of manurer and blood and bone.

Pests and Diseases Citrus gall wasp (Bruchophagus fellis) is a pest of citrus trees and has been found in Mandurah. It will decimate your citrus trees in the back yard, however you can control this if you look at your trees nearly on a daily basis through until the end of July Last month I sent in a picture of what a Citrus gall wasp looks like and how to control this pest in your garden. So, monitor all citrus trees on your property, looking for the stem thickenings (galls) that signal citrus gall wasp infestation from April to June each year. Remove any visible galls by the end of June each year and solarise any galls removed after June before disposing of them. Buy your bare rooted fruit trees in May and June and support your local Nurseries.







Pinny Police on the beat



In several of my previous articles I have discussed how Police rely on the community to solve crimes and how good CCTV really helps. The following story is a demonstration of how both of these factors, combined with good Police work can achieve results quickly.

On the 3rd of April a person in North Dandalup noticed something wasn't quite right at their neighbour's property. They contacted Pinjarra Police who immediately attended the address and confirmed a burglary had occurred. The home owners arrived shortly afterwards and a review of their CCTV identified two suspects and a vehicle being utilised.

Pinjarra Police contacted Mandurah Detectives and supplied the CCTV images. This immediately identified the suspects. The detectives with some local knowledge and playing a hunch, drove past a possible linked address for these offenders and observed the vehicle of interest.

The area was contained and a search warrant executed, locating all of the stolen property, the two suspects as well as two other people wanted by Police for other matters.

The suspects for the North Dandalup burglary had several outstanding inquiries. They were charged with numerous matters and remanded in custody. One of them is still in prison.

These offenders were in Police custody within an hour of the "switched on" neighbour contacting Police.

This is a good Segway into my next point, which is that Police need the community to report suspicious behaviour.

One of the things Pinjarra Police do to make sure we know what is going on in our community is monitor the local social media groups.

What we often see is people discussing suspicious behaviour or even offences that have happened, which doesn't correspond with what is actually reported to us. Please make sure if you see something you think is not quite right or if an offence has happened - report it.

If an offender has done something minor to you or your home, it is highly likely they have done it to others. If Police know about it we can do something about it. We may not solve the crime but we can prevent further occurrences by doing things such as increased patrolling of the area, or making sure residents know what is going on in their area, so they are more vigilant.

Sometimes the smallest thing such as a number plate from a vehicle or a description of clothing can be the piece of information that assists Police identify an offender.

Featuring Terry Caraher, Founder of Murray Arts and Crafts Society

Now trading as Pinjarra Arts Hub our society was established forty-nine years ago by Murray Shire Councillor Terry Caraher who served on the board from 1979 to 1998. Terry came to Australia from the western English county of Lancashire and initially worked on the WA railways both as a train driver and fueller. Terry was always greatly interested in all things artistic and was an avid collector of antique furniture a quantity of which graced his home which still stands in what is now Belswan Retirement Village.

He revisited England frequently and became greatly impressed by the arts and crafts groups he had observed there and believed Edenvale had great potential as an art centre even though, at the time, its historic buildings were in a sorry state of disrepair. Windows were gone, ceilings were down and floor boards had been vandalised and used as firewood by local Aborigines. Council wanted to bulldoze what had been the main residence of the original pioneer family, the McLartys, and create a car park. But Terry fought the plan and pushed for Edenvale, once renovated, to become the hub of Pinjarra's artistic life. Together with the nineteenth century school, St. John's Church built in 1861, and pioneer buildings, he envisaged Edenvale becoming the town's showpiece.

Terry placed an ad on 6th March 1974 asking art-inspired people to attend a meeting at the civic centre with a view to forming an arts and crafts club and was pleased to welcome 31 enthusiasts. Terry served as Chairman of Murray Arts on the executive committee for many years. First located, courtesy of Mr R Lane, at 12 Pinjarra Road, from small

beginnings the society grew and today consists of a craft outlet where our talented members present their beautifully hand-crafted wares for sale, a large well-stocked workshop known as The Barn and a craft and meeting room affectionately known as 'Terry's Room' named in his honour. Unfortunately, Terry passed away some years ago, but we are sure he would be extremely impressed by the fruits of his labour if he was with us today.

Backyard Buddies

Prohibited aquatic plants

Fret over these floaters

Keep your eyes peeled for aquatic plants such as Salvinia and water hyacinth – two highly invasive weeds that we need to report and eradicate from Western Australia. They have the ability to negatively impact our local ecosystems by out-competing local species and reducing water quality.

The costs and efforts taken to remove these aquatic plants once they enter our environment are massive. They can impede water flow, increase flooding and erosion, block agricultural irrigation channels, create health hazards and displace natural vegetation. Some aquatic plants can even form thick mats to resemble groundcover, creating drowning hazards for people and livestock.

Salvinia, (*Salvinia molesta*), is a non-flowering, free-floating aquatic weed that has pairs of oval leaves connected by a horizontal stem. They have a multitude of hair-like structures on top of the leaves which split and re-join at the tips to form eggbeater like structures helping them to be buoyant. They produce vegetatively - meaning that even small stems that break apart can form entirely new plants.

Water hyacinth, (*Eichhornia crassipes*), is a notorious floating weed with large funnel-shaped lilac flowers that have 6 petals and a yellow centre.

These flower summer to early autumn. The leaves are hairless, glossy and have a spongey base that helps them to float. This weed can double in size in just two weeks via flower pollination, or vegetatively. They have submerged fruits that can carry up to 300 seeds each, and these 1 mm seeds can be viable for up to 20 years!

Don't get caught out!

These plants are sometimes advertised on platforms like Facebook Marketplace, Gumtree or other channels, but they're illegal to have in WA. Salvinia and water hyacinth are prohibited species under the *Biosecurity and Agriculture Management Act 2007* and cannot be sold, traded or cultivated. This also applies to several other aquatic plants including *Rotala rotundifolia*, water lettuce (*Pistia stratoites*) and Sagittaria (*Sagittaria platyphylla*).

You can be a responsible gardener and report any suspect illegal plant sales, or the presence of these declared weeds in the environment. Reporting options include the Pest and Disease Information Service (PaDIS), the MyPestGuide® Reporter app or webpage, or you can anonymously report an illegal agricultural matter on crimestopperswa.com.au or phone 1800 333 000. If you're unsure about the plant, report it anyway.





What is osteoporosis?

Osteoporosis is a condition that causes bones become thin, weak and fragile. Over time the usually strong bone structure becomes porous, less dense and can easily break with even a minor bump or fall. Often osteoporosis is not diagnosed until a fracture occurs, as there are no symptoms of this loss in bone strength until it is fragile enough to fracture. This is why it is important to test and monitor bone density, before it reaches this critical level.

Am I at risk?

Different groups are more at risk of osteoporosis than others. Risk factors for Osteoporosis include:

- Family history of osteoporosis
- Aged over 70 years old
- Female
- Smoking/excessive alcohol consumption
- Inadequate Calcium or Vitamin D consumption
- Lack of physical activity
- Certain medications for breast/prostate cancer or epilepsy
- Long term or high dose corticosteroids (eg. preventer puffers or prednisolone)

If these risk factors apply to you discuss your bone health with your doctor or pharmacist. You may be eligible for a Bone density test to measure your bone strength and fracture risk.

What can I do to reduce my risk?

Both diet and exercise play an important role in protecting bone strength and reducing the risk of falls. This is especially important in patients at risk of osteoporosis.

Diet

Eating a healthy and varied diet including lots of fresh fruit, vegetables and whole grains is a great start towards good bone health. Calcium rich food are also important for building and maintaining your bones. To improve your bone health you should:

- Have adequate Calcium intake daily
- Avoid smoking
- Limit alcohol intake

Exercise

Although it is important to be active, not all exercise is beneficial for your bones. To reduce your osteoporosis risk, exercise needs to be ongoing and specific for encouraging bone density. Make sure you seek advice from your doctor or physiotherapist before starting new exercise programs, to ensure it is safe for you and to get the greatest benefit from it.

Types of exercises beneficial for bone health include:

- Weight bearing exercise, where your bones are supporting your body's weight eg. aerobics, jogging, stair walking, tennis.
- Resistance training with hand or ankle weights
- Balance or mobility exercises to reduce the risk of falls

Osteoporosis

What about Vitamin D?

Vitamin D is another important part of maintaining bone health. Vitamin D is needed to absorb calcium into your body and is important for bone growth. Some foods contain small amounts of Vitamin D but the main source is exposure to sunlight (UV light). Levels can vary throughout the year due to the different amount of sunlight and intensity, but if levels are too low it can lead to reduced bone density.

As little as a few minutes of sunshine daily can be enough for Vitamin D production, although longer periods will be required in winter. Sun exposure for Vitamin D also has to be balanced with being sun smart

and avoiding sun damage to the skin. Vitamin D levels can be deficient in people who stay indoors or are always covered when outdoors, or people with naturally darker skin.

Do I need Calcium or Vitamin D supplements?

Supplements should not be your only intake of Calcium and Vitamin D. Ideally you should get the majority of our calcium requirements from your diet and Vitamin D from the sun. Levels can be improved by eating more calcium rich food and getting the recommended daily sun exposure.

t can be difficult to achieve your recommended intake every day, especially as the requirement increases with age, which is where a supplement can be of benefit. Meeting your daily requirements will help to maintain stronger bones and reduce the risk of osteoporosis and fractures.

If you have a deficiency in Calcium or Vitamin D, or reduced bone density a supplement should be used daily to ensure you are getting adequate amounts. Supplements are available in different forms and dosages, so ask your pharmacist or doctor which is appropriate for you.

To raise awareness of osteoporosis we are conducting an instore screening event on Friday 12th May between 10am and 12 noon. The screening is run by healthcare professionals and is free of charge! The test is a non-invasive ultra sound of the heel and is completed in minutes. Our target audience is:

- Females aged 40 to 60
- Is perimenopausal or menopausal
- Patients considered to be at "high risk" of suffering osteoporosis eg family history, taking medicines impacting bone density

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


10am – 4pm daily on Saturday 3rd and Sunday 4th of June during the WA Day long weekend.

Centenary of the The Fallen Soldiers Memorial Hospital & Nursing Post History



In the 1890's, thousands of acres of forest were leased to private companies wanting to establish saw millings operations. One of these mills was established in Dwellingup. While the timber gathering teams worked in the forests, the family homes were built near the Dwellingup Mill, and slowly grew to become a town.

In June 1911, letters of the time sent to "The Colonial Secretary" reveal that a medical fund called the 'The Holyoake-Marrinup Medical Fund' had been set up to cover 'medical attention and hospital accommodation' for the workers (numbering 500) at the local mills, and their families. The local population felt that a doctor should live at Dwellingup and the fund would pay his salary of £33 6 shillings 8 pence per month; and a drug allowance of £4 3 shillings 4 pence per month. The Colonial Secretary did not agree that a doctor or a hospital should be situated in Dwellingup, but instead the department purchased a private house in Pinjarra and set up a hospital, situated on the banks of the Murray River.

Due to persistent approaches by the Holyoake Marrinup Medical Fund, in May 1914 a 'Casualty Ward' measuring 16' by 18' was completed in Dwellingup. The local committee felt that it was inadequate for the purpose and declined to furnish or use it, except sporadically. Instead, Pinjarra was used for all inpatients from the area with casualties being attended in Dwellingup.

A local doctor (Dr Stubbe) wrote to the Commissioner of Public Health in January 1922 requesting an extension of the Casualty Ward to a full hospital status comprising of two wards with a total of ten beds. Agreement was reached with Public Health in January 1922 that the hospital would be built on a pound for pound basis, with the timber supplied free by the State Sawmills at Dwellingup and bricks supplied from the State Brickworks at Armadale.

Tenders were called for 'labour only' in the "Western Worker" (now The West Australian Newspaper), and the "South Western Advertiser". The hospital was to be named 'The Fallen Soldiers Memorial Hospital'.

A tender of £185 10 shillings was accepted from a Mr Ward. The total cost of materials and erection was 630 shillings with a further 200 shillings for furnishings and equipment. The hospital was completed in May 1923, including separate quarters for the doctor who from that time resided in Dwellingup.

In May 1954 the bed capacity of the hospital including 4 male verandah beds, had increased to 17. In September 1958 the bed capacity was increased again to 25 including 6 verandah beds and 3 cots. 24th January 1961 saw a catastrophic bush fire sweep through the Dwellingup townsite and surrounds. Many homes and businesses were destroyed, including the hospital. The separate Nurses Quarters and clothes drying shed at the hospital survived the fires.

In April 1961 the Government of the day decided not to reinstate the hospital, instead using the Nurses Quarters as a Nursing Post. It was felt that it would be some time before Dwellingup would revive, if ever, and Pinjarra would supply hospital facilities for the foreseeable future. The terms of the Board of Management of The Fallen Soldiers Memorial Hospital expired in July 1962. The members did not seek re-election and the Nursing Post came under the administration of the Health Department of WA.
